Head out to Berrinba Wetlands and walk along the path with a torch. Can you see or hear any night animals?

There are many old growth trees at Boronia Bushlands that contain homes for many different animals such as bugs, termites, bees, birds or possums! How many animals can you spot?

count the colours

Count the colours when the wildflowers bloom in spring at Plunkett Conservation Park. Bring your art supplies and re-create it!

Hop along FUNderwood Hollow

Pretend you're a Brush-tailed rock wallaby and hop along the dry creek bed at FUNderwood Park, Underwood.

Go on a sound hunt

Find loud sounds such as birds singing and frogs croaking at Greenwood Lakes or Gould Adams Park.

Catch a glimpse of Moreton Bay from the top of Cornubia Forest Park.

ll River Explorers!

Try fishing, canoeing or boating at Logan River Parklands.

Get environmentally educated

Attend one of Council's free environmental activities or have fun in the Eco Kids Zone at the Logan Eco Action Festival (LEAF).

Watch eagles soar

Raise your gaze at Eagleby Wetlands where 19 of Australia's 24 Australian raptors can be spotted.

Watch trees grow, or plant your own

Regularly visit the newly planted trees at Riverdale Park or Wendt Park.
